"As man, He suffered, died, and was buried, and as man, He arose and returned from the realm of the dead.

"In the resurrection of Christ, it was proved that there was a man who could not be contained by death, "could not be ruled by Satan, by the power of corruption, who was stronger than the grave and death and hell. "In principle, therefore, Satan has as a matter of fact no longer the dominion over death. Christ by His death has overcome death (Heb. 2:14)."







"So then, God himself is at the heart of our answer to all three questions about the divine propitiation. "It is God himself who in holy wrath needs to be propitiated, God himself who in holy love undertook to do the propitiating, "and God himself who in the person of his Son died for the propitiation of our sins. "Thus God took his own loving initiative to appease his own righteous anger by bearing it his own self in his own Son when he took our place and died for us.

"Contrary to what we expect to be the case, therefore, the deeper into weakness and suffering and testing we go, the deeper Christ's solidarity with us.

"As we go down in pain and anguish, we are descending ever deeper into Christ's very heart, not away from it.

"Look to Christ. He deals gently with you. It's the only way he knows how to be. He is the High Priest to end all high priests.
