“But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses.” (16)

Observations about the process:

- divisiveness

“I appeal to you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and create obstacles contrary to the doctrine that you have been taught; avoid them.
